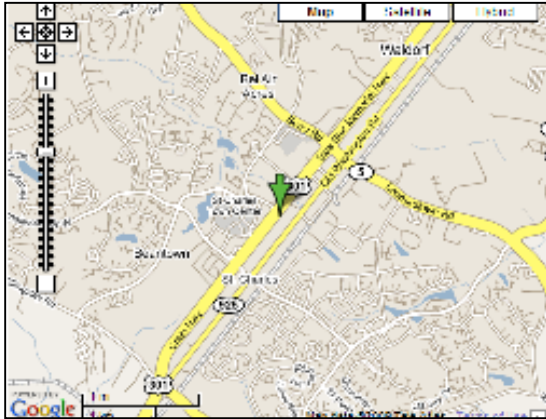

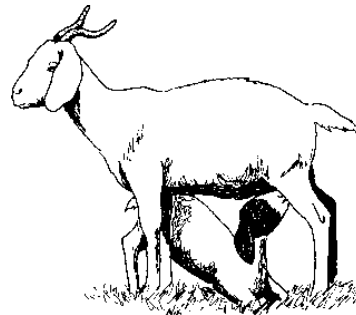

About the speaker

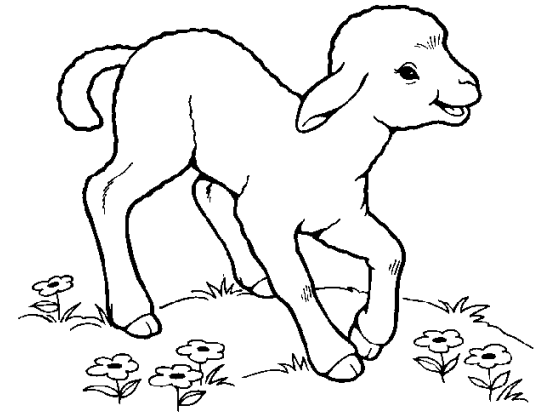
