

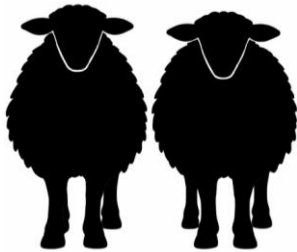


American WOOL

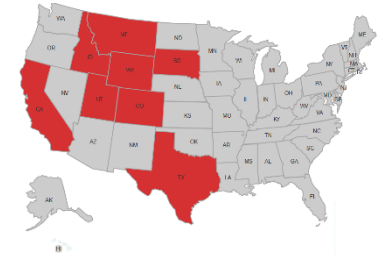
3 million

sheep and lambs were shorn in the US in 2025.



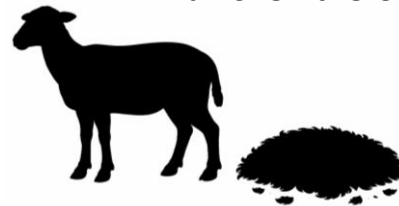
Wool is grown

in all 50 states, with the majority being produced in the Western US, with California, Colorado, and Utah being the top producing states. Fiber festivals are popular all over the US.



Shearing

Most sheep are sheared annually, before lambing and/or the onset of hot weather. Shearing is a skilled job.



Wool is sold

collectively to warehouses or wool pools. Some growers sell their wool to dealers or brokers or directly to a mill. Wool is sold either greasy (raw) or on a clean (scoured) basis. Adding value to wool and/or direct marketing fleeces can increase the profitability of wool production. There is a growing market for wool pellets as a fertilizer/soil amendment. Waste wool is used for this purpose.



Sheep produce

many types of wool, each with different qualities. Some sheep produce woolly fibers with very small fiber diameters (fine wool), whereas other breeds grow longer, coarser fibers. Some sheep produce dual-coated and/or multi-colored fleeces.



6.8 lbs.

was the average weight of a sheep's fleece in 2025.

\$1.40 per lb.

was the average price paid for wool (raw) in the US in 2025.

20.5 million lbs.

was the amount of shorn wool produced in the US in 2025. The value was \$28.7 million.
